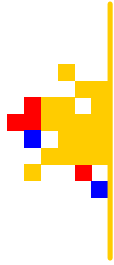

About our Program

Non-Point pollution and its effects on water quality is the focus of this year's camp. Our trips to local lakes, rivers, and streams will feature both pristine areas and developed areas. We will examine how human activities impact the quality of our waterway. Camp programs will include sessions on wildlife, soils, erosion, ecosystems and aquatic habitats. Our goal is to broaden the experiences of youth who are interested in the environment. Land and Water Conservation employees teach most of our programs.

Where is Camp held?

Camp is held at Trail's End Youth Camp (near Bruce, WI) in Rusk County. It is located on the banks of the Chippewa River and is perfectly suited to environmental learning. Camp facilities include kitchen, dining hall, cabins with bunks, swim area, canoe access, nature trails, and a shower house with flushing toilets.

Who can attend?

Camp is designed for students who have completed grades 8, 9 or 10 and are interested in learning about the environment. Registration cost for 2009 is \$100.00 per student. County Land and Water Conservation Departments and other local conservation organizations offer tuition scholarships.
