

TEMPORARY ELECTRIC FENCE

They can be a 1, 2, or 4 strand fence depending on the need. This type fence has fiberglass posts and polypropylene ribbon wire. A 12 volt battery or 110 a.c. energizer may be used.

All materials are provided with installation by the enrollee. Loan duration is on a year by year basis.

SCARE DEVICES

These noisemakers come in two types.

Hand held launcher pistols fire aerial screaming and banging loads.

Stationary propane cannons fire a loud report at an interval between 15 to 45 minutes.


REPELLENTS

The only repellent currently provided by the program is Hinder. It can be effective to abate nipping on young apple trees.

PROGRAM ENROLLMENT REQUIREMENTS

Program rules may change. Contact the office or the wildlife specialist for the most current information. Claims may be made for damage by -

Deer, Turkey, Bear, & Goose

1. Enrollee must have hunting access control of all owned and/or leased land.
2. Enrollee must notify the county damage specialist within 14 days of first damage for claims eligibility.
3. Enrollee must notify the county damage specialist at least 10 days prior to harvesting each crop.
4. Enrollee must follow abatement measures prescribed by county damage specialists. They may include shooting permits, temporary fence or other measures.
5. Enrollee may sign up for more than one eligible species. The species with the greatest acreage of "land suitable for hunting" shall be used to determine minimum hunting acreage.
6. Enrollee is eligible for abatement and claims on damages to crops that have been harvested if reported to the county damage specialist within 14 days of first damage.

7. Enrollee claims are subject to audits for accuracy and truthfulness. If fraud is found, the enrollee may be fined twice the value of any paid claim plus an additional \$1000. An enrollee may lose their right to participate for up to 10 years.

PROGRAM ENROLLMENT OPTIONS

1. OPEN PUBLIC HUNTING (OPH)

Hunting access is unrestricted, but hunters are required by law to notify the enrollee of their intent to hunt. Parking is restricted to designated areas. There can be no charge or fee for hunting, access or any other activity that includes hunting.

2. Managed registration process and other information to the hunter. Hunting is first come, first served. Two hunters per forty acres are allowed on suitable land that's determined by the county specialist. Hunting Access (MHA)

Hunters must register to hunt on enrolled properties. A hunting log must be completed and signed by the hunter each time they enter and exit the property. The enrollee will describe the

SHOOTING PERMITS

1. There must be evidence of at least \$1000 damage or likely hood of \$1000 in that year to be eligible.
2. Permits must be applied for before Oct.
3. A valid deer license is required.
4. A logbook shall be kept to record each hunter.
5. Only antlerless deer may be taken.
6. Hunting hours are 30 min. before sunrise to 15 min. after sunset.
7. Permits are given in lots of 5.
8. Half the number of tags issued must be filled within 45 days.
9. 80% of the tags must be filled by the end of the year.
10. Deer must be tagged and registered as in deer season.
11. Each hunter may shoot more than one deer but may retain only one.
12. Blaze Orange must be worn by all hunters; gun and bow alike.
13. Hunters may go 1/4 mile beyond property lines with landowner consent.
